# GUILDHALL OPENS FOLLOWING £1.4M RESTORATION PROJECT COMPLETION



Llantrisant's medieval Guildhall has re-opened to the public as a heritage and visitors' centre following a £1.4million transformation.

Funded primarily by the National Lottery Heritage Fund along with Cadw, the Welsh Government and other bodies, the Grade II Listed Building has been restored to its original glory to tell the remarkable story of this ancient hilltop town.

## **CLERK'S REPORT**

Llantrisant Town Trust can look back on 2019 as one of the most successful and rewarding year in its history.

Following eight long years of extremely hard work and £1,4million raised, the Guildhall restoration was completed. #### FREEMAN FOCUS

#### **Common Management**

Trustees continued to maintain and improve Llantrisant Common with a significant amount of cutting and management of overgrowth. During the year we were reintroduced to the Llantrisant & Beddau Defence Against Open Cast Mining, who were established in 1977 to fight the proposed development plans for the Common.

They have generously supported two projects to cut back overgrowth and bracken on the Common and we look forward to working with them again in the future.

#### **NRW Consultation**

A number of consultation meetings have taken place with Natural Resources Wales on a new three-year management plan to ensure the continuation of our Site of Special Scientific Interest title. We are currently exploring the opportunities of working even closer with NRW to ensure that the management of the Common is undertaken responsibly and for the benefit of the land and those animals that graze upon it.

#### **Fence Replacements**

RCT Council has replaced the damaged fence on the Heol y Sarn cattle grid and repaired the highway in that section. Fencing at Llwyn Crwn Isaf Farm has deteriorated significantly and we are trying to rectify this problem.

# **COURT LEET CEREMONY 2019**

Llantrisant Court Leet 2019 was another memorable event which saw a significant number of applicants enrolled as Freemen.



Owing to the unavailability of the Guildhall, the Court Leet was held once more in the Parish Hall on Swan Street.

In total 15 new Freemen were entered onto the Roll. A number of applicants were enrolled in absentia.

The Court Leet Dinner was also another outstanding success with almost 130 in attendance.

This year's Guest Speaker was BBC broadcaster Garry Owen. The next Court Leet takes place on Friday May 1 2020.

#### Y GRAIG HEALTHY HILLSIDE PROJECT

Trustees are working with Richard Wistow of Rhondda Cynon Taf Council and backed his successful bid for financial support from the Healthy Hillsides Project to eradicate any excess overgrowth on Y Graig.

This is being carried out in eight locations across RCT, Merthyr Tydfil and Caerphilly – some of the worst areas for grass fires in the UK.

They were successful in their bid to the Welsh Government and funding will be used to introduce large-scale fern cutting and the introduction of wider fire breaks on Y Graig which will allow increased grazing.

An agreement will be made between the Health Hillside Project and the Trust to identify what sections require maintenance.

A rolling programme of work will then take place on Y Graig for the next three years.

# PEACEFUL PROTESTS TO KILL SPEED ON FREEMEN'S COMMON

Freemen and residents held a series of peaceful protests on the Common to educate motorists about the dangers of speeding.




There have been three animals injured on Llantrisant Common due to the volume – and often speed – of motorists using Heol y Sarn.

One local resident was hit from her horse and suffered a fractured elbow. A series of four peaceful protests involving local residents, freemen and horse riders took place at key traffic times to educate motorists on the need to reduce their speed and use alternative routes whenever possible.

The response from some motorists are best not repeated.

#### **Fly-Tipping**

Unfortunately fly-tipping continues to be a problem, particularly at Castellau Road and discussions continue with Rhondda Cynon Taf Council over whether covert surveillance can take place on the areas most affected. We are particularly concerned with the amount of irresponsible dog owners who walk the Common and although they clear the faeces deposited by their animals they then discard the plastic bags on bushes, trees and the footpath. A new dog waste bin has been installed at the Cattle Grid on Heol y Sarn and we hope dog walkers will show more responsibility in this regard.

#### **Cattle Grid Repair**

RCT Council has replaced the damaged fence on the Heol y Sarn cattle grid and repaired the highway in that section. Fencing at Llwyn Crwn Isaf Farm has deteriorated significantly and we are trying to rectify this problem.

# LLANTRISANT CELEBRATES GUILDHALL MEDIEVAL FAYRE

Llantrisant Guildhal Opening Weekend was celebrated with a Medieval Fayre which attracted hundreds of people to the Castle Green. The Medieval Combat Society, De Caversham Household, Cosmeston Archers and Falconry UK combined to make it a memorable event.













#### FREEMEN'S HOME TRANSFORMED

For the past eight years Llantrisant Town Trust, a charity of volunteers, has worked tirelessly to breathe new life into the old timbers of the  $14^{\rm th}$  century building which stands in the shadow of its neighbouring ruined Norman castle



Hundreds of people flocked to the Guildhall on its opening weekend which also included a full-scale medieval fayre and knights in combat on the adjacent castle green to celebrate the exciting new community hub and activities base.

The restoration and transformation would not have been possible without £1 million funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Richard Bellamy, Director for Wales of the National Lottery Heritage Fund, said: "Thanks to National Lottery players, this beautiful building has been granted a new lease of life, enabling it to become an invaluable community building once again, fit for the 21st century. The historic Guildhall has an incredibly rich and fascinating history, and this vital transformation will enable it to prosper for many more years to come."

The Guildhall was the centre of power which governed an ancient borough for almost 700 years to execute the rights and privileges of the town's Charter presented in May 1346 by the Lord of Glamorgan.

Since then it has been in constant use by the Freemen of Llantrisant who ruled the borough for centuries. The Guildhall was used as Llantrisant's first national school, as a meeting place for the Baptist movement and enjoyed a long history as a court of law.

Rebuilt in 1773 it governed the adjoining market and fairs and boasted a cornmarket in the lower floor next to a set of cells that remained in constant use for prisoners until the 1870s.

During the past eight years it has undergone a massive restoration project has been restored to the very highest conservation standards. The large medieval chimney has been rebuilt to its original height, and the roof completed in new Welsh slate.

The main floor has been rebuilt, and extensive timber repairs carried out to the roof structure. New and refurbished windows and doors have been installed, and the exterior walls and porch have been completely repaired and renovated.

Present at the launch was Lord Dafydd Elis Thomas who helped secure additional funding through the Welsh Government for the completion of the building. (*Turn over*)

#### **Dr William Price**

Our showcase cabinet featuring the costume and personal belongings of Dr William Price are delighting visitors. The original costume is kept



at the National Museum St Fagans but thanks to the generosity of designer Thom Botwood we've had a replica made. A replica fox-skin hat was made by The Milliners Guild. He said: "This is undoubtedly my greatest before and after experience of the refurbishment of an historic building.

"When I first came here I was shocked, I remember the quality of the lath and plaster and not dare to walk across this very floor.

"You have achieved so much and this is down to the enthusiasm and devotion of those individuals who dedicated their time, without whom nothing would be possible.

"Cadw was delighted to be able to contribute to this achievement. May I congratulate you all in old Llantrisant for recognising your history and how important it is to put a new life into historic buildings

"The history of Wales is not about rebuilding redundant buildings. The celebration is when our historic buildings are used in the present and there is no better example than this Guildhall in Llantrisant."



The Guildhall now has the opportunity to become central to the community of Llantrisant once again by boosting the local economy as it welcomes more visitors to the town and wider county borough.

It houses a plethora of unique treasures, including the solid silver Mace of 1633 which survived the Civil War and is older than the one in the House of Commons. A full-scale exhibition of the life of cremation pioneer Dr William Price sits alongside the life-size mannequin of a Llantrisant archer who fought at the Battle of Crecy in 1346.

A wide range of interactive displays are available alongside many unique artefacts including the 18<sup>th</sup> century longcase clock made in Llantrisant and a portrait of the Llantrisant-born Lord Mayor of London Sir David Evans which has been in storage in Cardiff Mansion House for decades.

The refurbished landmark will also host a wide variety of community events, including exhibitions, conferences, weddings, activities, guest speaking programmes, concerts, private parties and school visits.

Llantrisant Guildhall Restoration Project is being made possible due to funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Cadw, Garfield Weston Foundation, Welsh Church Act Fund, Visit Wales, Llantrisant Community Council, Llantrisant Town Trust and public donations, and professional support has been given by Rhondda Cynon Taf County Borough Council.

# IN MEMORIAM: NOEL ISRAEL

Llantrisant Town Trust was deeply saddened to hear of the passing of

Freeman Noel Israel just days before his 92<sup>nd</sup>



birthday.

Noel Granville Israel was born on December 14

Noel Granville Israel was born on December 14 1926 in Gabalfa, Cardiff as the sixth of seven children.

He left school at 14 to work in a butchers shop and three years later he joined the Army in the special signal corps and was stationed in Gratz, Austria. It was his role to translate morse code messages from the Germans and these skills would go on to serve him in his career in the police force which he joined after being demobbed.

He married Myra in 1947 and they had two sons, Richard and John. Noel worked his way up through the ranks serving as a Sergeant and Detective Sergeant in the CID. In 1966 he assembled a team and was stationed for two weeks at the Aberfan Disaster, helping with the rescue mission, a testament to to his professionalism. In 1977 he was promoted to superintendant and during this time the family moved to Talbot Green. He retired in 1982 and spent many years researching the Israel family history as far back as 1752. Noel became a Freeman in May 1965. He was proud of his heritage and served as the Clerk to Llantrisant Town Trust from 1991 to 2000. Despite the passing of the years he remained a faithful and dedicated Freeman, rarely missing an event and looked forward to the Court Leet Ceremony and Dinner every year – even though his "wallet" was often mentioned by the chairman of the dinner.
