GUILDHALL'S FINAL PHASE TO BEGIN

Llantrisant Town Trust is delighted to announce that the final piece of the funding jigsaw is now in place and completion of the Guildhall is in sight.

Due to further support from HLF Cymru, Cadw, Garfield Weston Foundation and the Trust's own fundraising efforts, the last £300,000 needed to complete the interior of the building is in place.

As the local centre of power for almost 700 years which governed the ancient borough, the Guildhall has the opportunity to become central to the community of Llantrisant once again as a heritage and visitors' centre.

The final phase will allow contractors to fit ceilings, plaster and paint all the internal walls, fit the kitchen and toilets, complete the electrical, plumbing and drainage work, and install the lift, stairs and final floor finishes.

High specification security cabinets and a full exhibition display will be installed on both floors.

The Trust has also commissioned a full-size mannequin of a Welsh longbowman dressed in the uniform worn at the Battle of Crecy.

A longcase clock made by a Llantrisant clockmaker in 1780 has been traced and will go on display along with a showcase of Dr William Price items and a large oil painting of Sir David Evans, the Llantrisant-born Lord Mayor of London which is on loan from Cardiff Council.

To ensure its long-term sustainability, the Guildhall will also become a wedding venue and offer a wide-range of activities including workshops, rolling exhibitions, intimate dining experiences, concerts, evening lectures and even outdoor cinema.

CLERK'S REPORT

Llantrisant Town Trust has enjoyed another very busy year in its history.

We continue to focus our time on the maintenance and upkeep of Freeman's lands and extensive conservation work was undertaken on the Common and Graig.

In particular we are grateful to Cardiff Conservation Volunteers for their work to build a bridge for walkers of the Common and for cutting back overgrowth on the Graig.

At the Court Leet Ceremony we enrolled 16 new members to the Freeman's Roll and enjoyed a dinner in the company of Edward III and the Bishop of Durham! We are delighted to announce that the final funding package is available to us for the completion of Llantrisant Guildhall and we hope the interior and exhibition fit out will be finished by the summer of 2019.

The Trust has been involved in a whole range of fundraising activities towards the project, from concerts and guided history walks to another successful Big Picnic on the Castle Green.

We look forward to another busy year ahead and hope you will volunteer to support the Trust in its many endeavours.

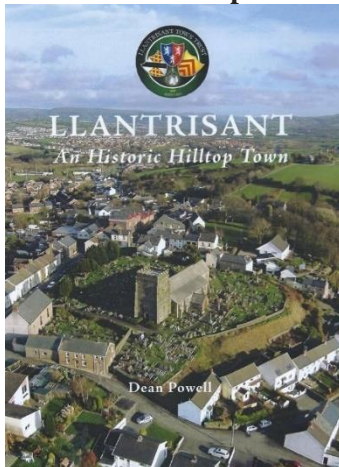
Guided History Walks

Court Leet 2018 was another memorable event which saw a significant number of applicants enrolled as Freemen.

Owing to the unavailability of the Guildhall, the Court Leet was held once more in the Parish Hall on Swan Street and welcomed applicants from Thailand and Australia.

In total 16 new Freemen were entered onto the Roll. A number of applicants were enrolled in absentia.

The Court Leet Dinner was also another outstanding success with almost 150 in attendance.

This year's Guest Speakers were two members of the Lions and Lilies who gave a fascinating account of "The Night of Crecy" as King Edward III and the Bishop of Durham.

FREEMEN'S HALL SCHEME LAUNCHED

Would you like to remember a Freeman in your family at their ancestral home of the Llantrisant Guildhall?

A Freeman's Hall is being designed within the building which allows families to include a lasting tribute to a late Freeman.

Following a donation of £100, a picture of the Freeman is mounted and framed along with a short biography and will be hung in the Guildhall.

To date around 20 Freemen are being remembered in this way.

All of the proceeds from the new Freeman's Hall will help fund the final phase of the Guildhall restoration and also support its long-term sustainability as a heritage and visitors' centre.

The current Freeman's Roll has more than 5,000 names listed since 1724 and we estimate that at least 2,000 Freemen are currently living somewhere in the world.

LLANTRISANT COMMON BRIDGE BUILT BY CONSERVATION TEAM

Freemen of Llantrisant are indebted to the Cardiff Conservation Volunteers for building a new walkway and bridge on the Common.



Over two weekends the volunteers worked tirelessly at Llantrisant Common to try and rectify a long-standing problem for walkers.

Llantrisant Community Council funded the materials and with the support of Cardiff Conservation Volunteers, we now have a brand new walkway and bridge to not only help walkers enjoy the Common safely, but provide further protection for our rare flora and fauna. Fly Tipping and Litter

The dropping of litter and incidents of fly tipping continue to be a major concern. Recently Trustees David Powell and Gareth Rees undertook clean-up operations of the Billy Wynt. After working with Dean Clarke of RCT Council a series of warning signs are now in place along Castellau Road and further surveillance will take place.

Common Pond Concerns

Amid growing concerns about the Common Pond we are pleased to say that scientific analysis by NRW shows no evidence of any pollution entering the pond. We are now considering further possible management measures.

Bracken Raking

The Butterfly Conservation & Biodiversity Team have been working with Trustee Huw Rees to undertake a large amount of bracken-raking on the Common. Our gratitude to all of those involved.

FREEMEN'S LAND: OUR COMMITMENT

Llantrisant Town Trust's purpose is to protect the rights and lands of the Freeman and we continue to uphold that commitment throughout the generations.



The Trust is responsible for the management of the Common, Cymdda Bach, Y Graig, Town Pump and Castle Green. They have also established a Guildhall Trust CIO to manage the Guildhall as a separate entity.

The Common covers 274 acres and Freeman's rights to graze animals there predates the Charter of 1346.

Because of the way the common has been managed, with the exclusion of sheep, an interesting and diverse flora has developed.

This has resulted in it being declared a Site of Special Scientific Interest, and it is managed to maintain the botanical diversity, and to provide suitable grazing for cattle and horses.

It is important for its variety of grassland, rich in different plant species while streams and patches of scrub add to the variety of habitat for insects, birds and other wildlife.

This year we have welcomed the large-scale investment by Natural Resources Wales. Wildlife Trust and Butterfly Conservation Team along with the support of the Cardiff Conservation Team in enhancing this land. Further bracken cutting is due to take place shortly.

Upkeep of the land, requires an enormous amount of maintenance work which is why we hope more Freeman will come forward and assist us in our endeavours. We are particularly grateful to Freeman Huw Rees, Dewi John and Henry Alexander for coordinating this year's activities.

Our other significant parcel of land is the isolated hill know as Y Graig and the Billy Wynt as its affectionately called.

Unfortunately it has been the victim of littering by irresponsible visitors and we want more Freeman to be vigilant in trying to keep this iconic tower and mountainside clear of debris.

Only a few years ago we re-introduced grazing animals to Y Graig and look forward to further work with South Wales Fire Service to cut the overgrown pathways shortly.

BILLY WYNT: WHAT WAS IT?

On the isolated hilltop of Y Graig stands Llantrisant's famous tower and for generations we've argued over what it really is.....

Tradition attributes its origins as a windmill dating from the 13th century but early records refer only to two mills found to the south and in Pentyrch.

The reference to the town mill being burnt several times during insurrections of the period may have been Felin Fawr at Maesyfelin.

The town mill may also be the same one as identified by the Royal Commission but there is no reference to a windmill whatsoever.

Billy Wynt was probably an auxillary tower to the castle, because it was blessed with a view of the main route through the Ely Valley - making it an ideal command post for the local garrison.

It would seem improbable to build a windmill in an area rich in water power. The Clun, the Mychydd and many smaller streams in the area provided sufficient power for water mills even in drought years.

The circular stone tower was restored as a folly in 1890 at the request of the Llantrisant Town Trust which maintains the structure.

FREEMAN FOCUS

Find out more about the life of Lord Talbot, the fifth Freeman listed on the Roll dated 1724:



Charles Talbot, 1st Baron Talbot PC was a British lawyer and politician. He was Lord Chancellor of Great Britain from 1733 to 1737. Talbot was the eldest son of the Bishop of Durham, was educated at Eton and Oriel College, Oxford, and became a fellow of All Souls College in 1704.

He was called to the bar in 1711, and in 1717 was appointed solicitor general to the Prince of Wales. Having been elected a member of the House of Commons in 1720, he became Solicitor General in 1726, and in 1733 he was made lord chancellor and raised to the peerage with the title of Lord Talbot, Baron of Hensol.

Talbot enjoyed the reputation of being a wit; he was a patron of the poet James Thomson.

Talbot is also remembered as one of the two authors of the Yorke-Talbot slavery opinion whilst he was a crown law officer in 1729).

In 1709 he married Cecil, daughter and heiress of Charles Mathews of Castell y Mynach, Glamorgan, and the grand-daughter of David Jenkins of Hensol.
